The above numbers reflect the number of individuals eligible to receive transportation vouchers from the 2022 CDBG Grant. All individuals served met the CDBG income guidelines. Applicants were required to complete an application, provide documentation regarding residency and income verification.

Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

Since Hurricane Ida, the parish along with neighboring parishes has seen an increase in homelessness. Many federally funded housing complexes endured damage and were deemed unlivable in the Hurricane. The same is true with many privately owned complexes and personal homes. FEMA involvement and HUD's disaster recovery team provided some assistance and The City of Thibodaux continues function as a referral agency depending on residents' needs. For short term needs residents are referred to local churches and organizations who offer short-term homeless assistance such as rental assistance for a month or two, hotel and food vouchers and other short-term assistance. The Lafourche Parish Community Action office provides emergency assistance to pay energy bills through the LIHEAP program funding by the Department of Energy through the State of Louisiana. The Good Samaritan Food Bank provides access to food and other products to needy low income residents. Chez Hope in Thibodaux offers assistance to homeless/displaced women with children who are in abusive situations and may be at risk of becoming homeless. The agency provides temporary shelter and other services. It also provides transitional housing to approximately four families. Catholic Social Services and Housing Services in Houma provide assistance to the homeless and temporarily displaced individuals and families. The agencies provide food, clothing, funds for medical expenses and other help as needed. Without a homeless shelter locally, the City of Thibodaux relies on neighboring Terrebonne Parish's facilities. Any person claiming to be homeless and whose needs cannot be met by local agencies are referred to agencies in the Continuum of Care. The Continuum of Care coordinates homeless activities throughout the area. START Corporation, based in Houma, LA provides assistance to homeless individuals who suffer from mental illnesses. The services are offered to individuals in Terrebonne, Lafourche and Assumption Parishes.

Due to additional funding of CARES in response to the COVID 19 Pandemic the City was able to allocate funding to the food bank, rental and mortgage assistance and utility assistance. This was a new public service the City ventured into.

Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

The City of Thibodaux's Department of Housing and Community Development acts as a referral system to other agencies that provide services. Lafourche Parish Community Action Agency and Catholic Social Services administers such grants to assist with emergency medical, rental and utility services. Individuals are also referred to the Louisiana Coastal Homeless Coalition.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: likely to become homeless after being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); and, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs

The City of Thibodaux maintains a Service Agency Directory and ensures communication with agencies when accepting applications for Section 8 and notifications of public meetings regarding funding/planning. Individuals who express that they are homeless are linked to The Louisiana Coastal Homeless Coalition for crisis intervention. Intervention services provided, include but are not limited to: case managements, finance management, counseling, rental assistance, utility assistance, and job training.

The City of Thibodaux promoted a number of press releases to link needy citizens to services available in the community in efforts to keep people in safe housing due to the Covid Pandemic.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

The City of Thibodaux's Department of Housing and Community Development receives inquiries about available services for homeless individuals. The department links individuals to community resources. It provides information on the Section 8 program, its requirements and the process to apply. Individuals are also linked to public housing and other resources available in the community. Many individuals who are homeless are in dire need of case management services to address barriers and assist in facilitating successful transitions to permanent housing and independent living.

Actions taken to address the needs of public housing

The Thibodaux Housing Authority is administered as a separate entity and not associated with the office of Housing and Community Development. Although separate, there is collaboration among agencies. The Office of Housing and Community Development will continue to provide technical support as requested when preparing the agency's environmental review for submission to HUD and review of consistency with PHA plans. During the planning process, the City of Thibodaux did not receive a request for funding for projects/activities for the housing authority for the 2020-2024 Consolidated Plan period. In previous years, CDBG funds have been used to improve the living environment in and around public housing sites. All requests by the Housing Authority are considered for funding, if eligibility is met. Projects were completed near the housing authority.

Actions taken to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and participate in homeownership

The City of Thibodaux continues to serve as a referral agency to local home ownership programs such as Catholic Charities. Any information on upcoming events will be shared with the Thibodaux Housing Authority.

The City of Thibodaux is a High Performer.

The Thibodaux Housing Authority is a Standard Performer. There are no troubled PHAs in the jurisdiction.

The City will continue to comply with all HUD rules and regulations as the allocation, although limited, is needed to address critical needs. Many priority needs would go unmet without the funding.

Actions taken to reduce lead-based paint hazards. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The Office of Public Health administers the Louisiana Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Program. Its purpose is to eliminate childhood lead poisoning through a comprehensive approach to the prevention of lead poisoning and the management of children found to have elevated blood levels. Some of the services provided include: monitoring of blood lead levels in children six years of age and under, Identification of children with elevated blood lead levels, care coordination for these children with elevated blood lead levels, environmental inspection for the children with elevated blood lead levels, community and professional education on childhood lead poisoning. In an effort to eliminate the hazards of lead paint for families with children under the age of 6 and pregnant women, The Office of Housing and Community Development, through its Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher Program, inspects all rental units for deteriorated paint before rental subsidies are approved and families are allowed to move in. Property owners are required to mitigate or abate any deteriorated paint found, using safe work practices as required by HUD. All units are also inspected on a bi-annual basis. All units owned by the Thibodaux Housing Authority have been inspected for lead-based paint and none has been found. The Director for the Office of Housing and Community Development has attended (through DEQ) the Lead Based Paint inspector course. "Protect Your Family from Lead In your Home" pamphlet is given to all recipients of Section 8 assistance as an educational tool and to further protect the family from the hazards of lead in housing built before 1978.

Actions taken to reduce the number of poverty-level families. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

Although the City of Thibodaux does not directly fund programs targeted to eliminate poverty (other than Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher Program), it will continue to refer families in need to agencies providing services throughout the community. Programs administered by churches and other non-profit agencies that provide emergency assistance to low income residents are supported by the City. The

City's Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher Program provides rental subsidies to low and extremely low income families. The program allows families to live in decent housing with a minimal amount of rental payment. The program presently provides rental assistance to approximately 230 families. The Good Earth Transit's Transportation System began providing bus services to the City of Thibodaux in October 2011. This service provides economic opportunities to low and moderate income residents by having access to transportation for employment opportunities in nearby Terrebonne Parish, where jobs are more plentiful. The City provided bus vouchers, free of charge, to low and moderate income residents. The Lafourche Parish Office of Community Action administers many programs which provides emergency assistance to low-income residents who may be at risk of becoming homeless. They provide weatherization grants, distribution of food/nutrition goods provided by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The agency also administers the LIHEAP program which provides low income families assistance to pay a portion of their energy bills. The Good Samaritan Food Bank, operated by the Catholic Social Services in Lafourche Parish, provides food and household items to families in need.

- Enhance educational opportunities for tenants and landlords in Thibodaux

Actions taken to overcome effects of the impediments are as follows: the Director continues to be a member of the Louisiana Housing Council and attends offered trainings. The Director is a member of the Louisiana Housing Corporation mailing list. The Director attends annual Legislative (May) and Fall Conferences (September) sponsored by the Louisiana Housing Council. In addition, teleconferences and podcasts are viewed frequently to stay abreast of new policies and practices required. Fair Housing pamphlets are included in all Section 8 Housing Voucher Landlord and Tenant Packets. Appropriate

signage is displayed in the Housing and Community Development office. The Departmental website has been reconstructed to include: Fair Housing (Equal Opportunity for all booklets, Housing Discrimination complaints, Bad Landlords in Federal Housing, Fair Housing Public Service Announcements) and first time home buyers (Buying a Home Guide, Shop Compare and Negotiate, and 8 Signs of Predatory Lending). The City of Thibodaux has a longstanding relationship with Catholic Charities and acts as a referral system. Catholic Charities: assists low income families to become first time homebuyers through counseling, education, financing and advocacy. Pamphlets are available in the lobby of the Housing and Community Development Department. Due to the limitations in funding, we did not mail out information; however we ensured the same information was available on our website, www.ci.thibodaux.la.us and in our office. The Department acts as referral agency and often assists in providing information to new and inquiring landlords.

On June 16, 2022 the City of Thibodaux partnered with Bayou Region Incubator to offer a free Fair Housing Public Seminar at Nicholls State University.

The Office of Housing and Community Development monitors its program activities and expenditures. The CDBG director is responsible for the sole administration, monitoring, and evaluation of progress of the CDBG program. The COT finance department monitors and balances all expenditures and drawdown deposits through the use of internal spreadsheets. Because of the small amount of CDBG funds the City receives, the program director is responsible for the timely completion of all activities. The Director seeks out and attends CDBG HUD sponsored trainings to receive the most current information and guidance on program standards, regulations, and guidelines; where feasible. Most trainings, due to limited funding, are viewed in the form of archived telecasts on the HUD website. Through the use of in-house financial reports and IDIS reports, the Director is able to ensure compliance with benchmarks and monitor all funding expenditures. The director monitors the progress of construction projects by visiting work sites and by meeting weekly with the project architect to ensure work is on schedule. Bus Voucher redemption was reconciled monthly to compare issuance verses usage. The City of Thibodaux did not met HUD's timeliness expenditure rate at the end of the reporting period (1.76%) The City did provide HUD with reasons beyond its control for the delay. The ratio has since been met. The 2023 timeliness ratio is currently .01% away from being met. Appropriate corrective action measures are in place.

The City of Thibodaux conducted two public hearings during the planning process of its 2020 CDBG Program. The proposed use of funds was published in the Daily Comet Newspaper outlining the amount of funds expected to be received from HUD, any other funds to be used from previous years, a brief description of the activities to be carried out as well as the location of each activity. A public notice was published in the City of Thibodaux's official journal, "The Daily Comet" on August 15, 2023 advising the availability of the completed 2022 Consolidated Annual

Performance and Evaluation Report (CAPER). The 2022 CAPER was made available to the public for review beginning on August 16, 2022 and ending August 31, 2023. The CAPER was also made available on the department's website: http://www.ci.thibodaux.la.us/departments/housing/cdbg.asp. No comments were received during the comment period.
